- Increased awareness about higher education among society, encouraged by national and state government policy in terms of financial provision and subsidiary endowment.
- Graduation courses can be extended up to post graduation and research level
- ➤ Inclusion and incorporation of certificate, diploma and advanced diploma courses to increase the employability of student
- Enhancement of concealing and consultancy services
- Scope for development of social and industrial network

CHALLENGES:

- Major admission flow is diverted to professional courses –engineering and pharmacy.
- > Availability of several traditional colleges in vicinity that create competitive stress
- > Students with rural and tribal background and they are academically deprived
- ➤ No non-salary grants
