The College with its sister institute, has also subscribed selected Elsevier journals in an online mode. The library is fully automated. The library uses LibSys 6.0 software for regular housekeeping work of the library. Books and students' library cards are barcoded. The book is issued to the students and faculty using a barcode based system. Library, stack section, circulation counter and reading room are kept under CCTV surveillance.

The office administration is fully computerized. There is established procedure for handling various accounts for effective management of the financial resources. A fully computerized account system is adopted using the accounting software (Tally).

The college follows the semester, credit-grading system. The college runs multidisciplinary and UG and PG courses and the effective implementation of teaching learning process is assured by recruiting adequate number of qualified and experienced faculty. College also offers several certificate and diploma courses for career enhancement of the students.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The admission procedure is fully merit based for all courses. Enough number of seats are available for undergraduate courses. We have considerable number of students from the nearby states such as Madhya Pradesh and Gujarat. At the beginning of the academic session, the administration ensures effective implementation of curriculum through well planned academic colander. Various committees have been formed for monitoring of teaching-learning and evaluation

process. The college has introduced the faculty diary which helps teachers and the administration for up keeping the records such as student attendance, time table, details if test tutorial and the internal examinations, co-curricular and extracurricular activities as well as the result analysis.

Being affiliated to Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, the college follows the evaluation structure as recommended by the university and hence has limited scope for modifying the evaluation system. At present, semester system for all levels and all faculties has been implemented by the university. Total weightage for external evaluation is 60% and for internal evaluation is 40%. The evaluation system is online as well as offline. The college as well as university strives to declare the results before 45 days.

6.3.4 Research and Development

More than 55% faculty members have received research grants in the form of major and minor research projects. A total amount research grants fetched in last five years amounts to the tune of 55 Lakhs. Two faculty members have been awarded with DST young scientist award with the total grant around 40 lakhs. The College is recognized as research centre for Physics, Microbiology and Biotechnology and presently 16 students are doing their doctoral research in various departments. Seven teachers are recognized as research guides of Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. A research promotion committee is formed to promote and monitor the research related activities. The committee works with IQAC and promotes faculty members to write and submit the research project proposals, apply for conferences and workshops grants etc.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The college owns a sprawling three storey building with a total built in area around 5000 sq. meter in a campus of 15.5 acres. A well ventilated classrooms, laboratories with necessary equipment, seminar hall, library and reading room facilities are available. Ramp and lift facility is available for differently abled individuals. Necessary facilities for ICT based leaning such as LCD projectors, Laptops, Audio-visual facilities are available. A staff room with enough space is available, a separate and adequately maintained sanitary facilities are available for the staff and students. Girls' common room is available. A separate block for principal and vice principal office, administrative office, a conference room, audio-visual hall, a common auditorium facility, examination and confidential

work room, NSS room, store room and gymkhana is available. A separate room for IQAC and NAAC related work is likely to be available soon. A library with over 20000 books and over 11000 titles, several thousand e books and 74 academic journals and magazines is available. The library works between 7:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and it remains available for extended hours during the examination period. The college is effectively using N-LIST database of academic content through the INFLIBNET. Reprographic facility, book bank facility is available. Library is automation is completed. The College with its sister institute, sharing the subscription of selected Elsevier journals in an online mode. The maintenance of infrastructure facilities is met through the UGC fund and from student fees. The college has a separate dedicated team for maintaining the infrastructure, cleanliness of campus and garden etc.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Teachers training is given priority and therefore several teachers are sent for faculty development programmes time to time. For pedagogical upliftment, IQAC of the college conducts a special orientation programme for newly appointed teachers. Teacher performance is critically assessed by the management through the academic diary, institutional API and result analysis. Teachers are encouraged to undertake the research and student centric activities. Teachers who excel in institutional API are incentivised and felicitated on the occasion of teacher's day every year. The management also runs welfare schemes for the teaching and non-teaching. A housing society, student co-operative store, recreation facility, credit society etc. are run by the management.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Permanent staff is recruited by following the rules and regulations of UGC and Government.

Temporary staff is recruited by management. Preference is given to the qualified and experienced faculty in recruitment.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

With the efforts of the principal and the NAAC, the college has signed four MoUs with the nearby institutes for research collaborations. Various research related activities, student training, and collaborative projects are undertaken based on these MoUs. The college also organizes industrial visits for final year students.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

- The college conduct admission process for UG courses by following guidelines of university. A detailed schedule of the admission procedure is displayed on College website as well as it publicized on College campus through hoardings etc.
- The admission procedure is fully merit based for all courses. Enough number of seats are available for undergraduate courses. We have considerable number of students from the nearby states such as Madhya Pradesh and Gujarat.
- At the beginning of the academic session, the administration ensures effective implementation of curriculum through well planned academic colander.
- For PG courses, the centralized admission process is carried out by the University.

The college firmly believes in institutional and social values. Several best practices are adopted. Many official processes such as sanctioning the leave, accounting etc. are made paper less and use of technology is promoted. As per the policy of government of Maharashtra, use of plastic is prohibited. Accordingly the college has undertaken several green initiatives and the campus is declared as **Plastic free** zone. The design of buildings assures maximum usage of natural light and air in order to save electricity. The energy is used efficiently by using LED lights on internal roads. Water is used efficiently by using drip and sprinkled water in the garden. Rain water harvesting system is installed in the building. Student training is given a lot of emphasis. Every year several students with a research flair are identified and sent for the research training to various places such as Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon and Homi Bhabha

Center for Science Education, Mumbai. From last 16 years, the college is conducting state level microbiological contest (Microbioolympiad) for developing the interest of students towards the competitive exams in life sciences.

The college has prepared a perspective plan to achieve the short and long term goals (http://www.rcpasc.ac.in/perspectiveplan). The IQAC of the college has reviews and revise the quality policy of the institute time to time. Recommendations of the NAAC peer team during the IInd cycle are discussed in depth and the policies were designed to address the issues raised during the peer team visit. The college has given utmost importance to these recommendations and the perspective plan (2014-15 to 2024-25) was prepared to overcome the shortcomings. In the last five years, the college has done a significant progress in the area of research and extension activities. The faculty members of the college have been able to publish their research work in the journals of high impact (Data template 3.3.4) and international repute. The highlights of perspective plan according to NAAC quality framework are discussed in ensuing pages. A few select journal are International journal of biological macromolecules (Impact factor: 3.4), Journal of Surfactants and Detergents (Impact factor: 2.4), Phototherapy research (Impact factor: 3.2), Bioresource technology (Impact factor: 3.4) and Process biochemistry (Impact factor: 4.4). A total of 259 research papers and the research review articles have been published by the faculty. Several faculty members have authored the subject books, text books and the reference books
